Two bullets hit man in standoff at the same time

The man killed in a standoff with police in Redwood City was struck “nearly simultaneously” by a bullet from his own gun and a round fired by a police officer, a prosecutor said yesterday.

Growth rate starting to slow

The rate of growth in Santa Clara and San Mateo counties is slowing, and a former Palo Alto planning commissioner said it is all part of a pattern — as the population numbers stabilize, area rents stabilize.

Former planning Commissioner Arthur Keller said the census estimates

released yesterday explain a lot of the data he has already seen. Rents are leveling off and the tech market is slowing down, so it makes sense that population growth would stabilize, he said.

He pointed to the Post’s article in February that rents in Mountain View

and San Mateo were leveling off, when comparing last year’s rent increases with the year before. This data came from Apartment List, an on-line site that tracks rents. Palo Alto’s rents, however, continue to rise.

Palo Alto Mayor Greg Scharff said

he has heard from people that things are slowing down. The area had a really strong run, but now companies aren’t expanding at the same rate as before, he said.

New census estimates released yesterday show that Santa Clara County’s population increased only 0.5% between 2015 and 2016, but during the [See GROWTH, page 54]

No fine for Fine

Palo Alto Councilman Adrian Fine won’t be fined by the state’s Fair Political Practices Commission following an anonymous complaint accusing him of not putting his campaign’s identification number on the envelope of a mailer he sent to residents.

Galena West, of the FPPC’s enforcement division, sent Fine a warning letter yesterday, stating that he was in violation of not including his FPPC identification number on the envelope. But because this is the first case against Fine and he included his number on the [See FINE, page 54]

Dramatic move over health care bill

Abandoning negotiations, President Trump demanded a make-or-break vote on health care legislation in the House, threatening to leave “Obamacare” in place and move on to other issues if today’s vote fails.

The risky move, part gamble and part threat, was presented to GOP lawmakers behind closed doors last night after a long and intense day that saw

a planned vote on the health care bill scrapped as the legislation remained short of votes amid cascading negotiations among conservative lawmakers, moderates and others.

At the end of it the president had

had enough and was ready to vote and move on, whatever the result, Trump’s budget director Mick Mulvaney told lawmakers.

“Negotiations are over, we’d like to vote tomorrow and let’s get this done for the American people.’ That was it,” Rep. Duncan Hunter of California said as he left the meeting, summariz- [See HOUSE, page 54]
